
Unit 1: Frindle

Lesson 1: Introduction to Book (Frindle)

Objectives:

Activity 2: Read the Summary of the Book.

Nick Allen is a clever and playful fifth grader who always finds ways to make school more exciting. One day, his teacher, Mrs. Granger, gives the class an assignment about how words are created and added to the dictionary. This sparks Nick's imagination. He decides to invent a new word: instead of saying "pen," he calls it a frindle. At first, it is just a small joke among his classmates, but soon the whole school — and even the town — starts using the new word.

Mrs. Granger is strict and doesn't like losing control of her classroom, so she fights against the word. The principal even visits Nick's parents because the situation grows so big. But Nick's creativity cannot be stopped. Eventually, the word spreads across the country and even enters the dictionary. By the end, Nick learns that ideas have power, creativity can make a difference, and with that power comes responsibility.



Lesson 1: Film Introduction & Themes

Objectives:

Identify the main characters and moral dilemma

Read the Summary

Marty Preston is an 11-year-old boy who lives in a small town in West Virginia. One day, he finds a frightened beagle dog being mistreated by its owner, Judd Travers. Marty feels sorry for the dog and names him Shiloh.

Marty wants to keep Shiloh safe, but his parents say the dog belongs to Judd. Instead of telling the truth, Marty secretly hides Shiloh in a shed and feeds him scraps of food. This means he lies to his parents and sneaks around, which makes him feel guilty.

Eventually, Judd finds out. Marty decides to be honest and makes a deal with Judd: he will work for him to earn Shiloh. In the end, Marty's honesty and responsibility win Judd's respect. Marty learns that lying may seem easier at first, but honesty and courage are the best way to solve problems.

Further Discussion Questions

- 1. Judd Travers and Marty's father thought that it was wrong for Marty to keep Shiloh after the dog ran away from Travers the second time. Marty thought differently. Describe the basis for each position, give your own position, and explain why.
- 2. When Shiloh ran away the second time, was Marty right to keep the dog hidden and to lie about having seen him?
- 3. Let's change the facts a little. Let's suppose that after Shiloh had run away from Travers the second time and Marty was keeping the dog in the shed up the hill from his house, Travers had sincerely said that he was sorry for hurting the dog and had decided to change his ways and never hurt a dog again. If that had happened, what affect would it have on whether Marty had any moral basis to lie and keep the dog hidden?
- 4. Marty said that he had made a promise to Shiloh to take care of him and that this was one reason why he had to lie about keeping the dog in the old shed. What affect did this have on Marty's right to lie about the fact that he was keeping Shiloh in an old shed?
- 5. Is telling half-truths or failing to tell the whole truth as bad as a flat out falsehood?
- 6. What about the last lie that Marty told, the one to his parents, when he claimed that he didn't know why Judd Travers had changed his mind and let Marty work off the cost of the dog. Was this something Marty should have done?
- 7. Marty's father says that the trouble with lying is that no one can believe what you say after the lie. What does it take to be trusted again after you have lied to someone?
- 8. When the neighbors start preparing food for the family after word gets around that Marty is trying to buy cheap food from the market, does Marty have an obligation to his parents to tell the truth so that the town won't think that the family is in dire straights?
- 9. When Marty's mother gives him a day to figure things out before she tells his father about Shiloh, is she committing a lie of omission? Did she do the right thing?
